









Blossoming wild flowers favoured by bumblebees

Guidelines: Plant in drifts in the open or against hedges
 Aim for a short list of varieties but plant in masses
 Avoid chemical insecticides and particularly neonicotinoids

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This is not an exhaustive list but is based on the plants that are the most valuable to bumblebees in this area.

Shrubs such as dog roses, honeysuckle, rosemary, lavender, heather, gorse and bramble as well as some trees can be added to provide vital forage 12 months of the year (see separate sheet).

Notes:

For a quick splash of colour buy plants in bloom.

Annuals bloom a month later than perennials.

Biennials will not bloom in the first year.

These plants will be good for other pollinators too (and creatures that feed on them).
